Letter from our Pastor



An Extraordinary Parish for Ordinary People

Dear Friends in Christ,

John Ireland was one of those nineteenth century American bishops who built parishes, schools and religious houses all over Minneapolis and presided over an exciting period of growth in church history. His legacy stands even today. But when Eastern Rite Catholics started appearing in Minnesota, he overextended his authority and launched a nasty persecution because he could not understand that being Catholic was not equal to Latin Rite Catholic. He is referred to as the Father of the Orthodox Church in America, because his ignorance and intransigence impelled thousands of Catholics who had lived in communion with the Pope for centuries back into the Orthodox Church. Almost a century and a half later, the effects of his disastrous policies are still felt in both the Catholic and Orthodox churches. It could have been different, but it wasn't.

When I was ordained, I made a promise to celebrate the rites according to the tradition of the Church. I have always celebrated according to the liturgical books reformed after the Second Vatican Council, because they were handed down by the legitimate authority of the Church. The history of how they came to be is fascinating, filled with shadows and with intrigue. They do not emphasize certain aspects of the divine mystery in the same way as the pre-conciliar liturgical books, but they are in themselves orthodox, even if some have instrumentalized them to further agendas which have been far from right-believing. I also have celebrated according to the pre-conciliar liturgical books when there was a demonstrable pastoral need, because they constitute the liturgical and spiritual patrimony of the Roman Church. The classical Roman Rite of the Church remains a beautiful treasure of the spiritual patrimony of the Church, even if some have instrumentalized it to further agendas that do not serve the communion of the Church. I was also asked to obtain bi-ritual faculties to celebrate one of the Eastern Rites, the Maronite Rite, which has its own incredible history of reform, restoration and renewal. The Maronite Rite also highlights different aspects of the Paschal Mystery different from how the two forms of the Roman Rite celebrate that mystery.

I did not promise to celebrate the rites only according to one particular form of the Church's liturgy, but according to her tradition, and so I celebrate according to what has handed down to me by the Church's authority in this time and by the Church's living tradition of all time. In doing so, I recognize the Church has the right to form and reform those texts, and bind the faithful to them. What the Church cannot do is betray the essence of the tradition.

There's an old saying "sausage making is not pretty." The history of the form and reform of liturgical texts is the kind of thing that is rather a bit niche hobby even among faithful Catholics. But Catholics are often very much attached to the prayers, rites and ceremonies that they either grew up with or became accustomed to. And that is true whether that be the Ordinary Form in English, the Extraordinary Form in Latin, or one of the Eastern Rites. There is a great need for pastoral sensitivity in this area. Catholics who found themselves under persecution under Archbishop Ireland for their attachment to their own legitimate patrimony and tradition truly felt that the Church left them, rather than the other way around. His attempts to bully and threaten them into becoming just like every other Catholic in his archdiocese did not end well. That doesn't take away his tremendous accomplishments as a builder bishop who also did a lot of good for the Church. But respect for legitimate diversity within the Church could have meant a very different story for the Catholic and Orthodox Churches in this country. Hopefully we can learn from the past and apply those lessons for the future.

days of fasting & abstinence

The present laws of the Church regarding fasting and abstinence during the Season of Lent are as follows:

1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting. On days of fasting, one full meal is allowed. Two lesser meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted. Catholics who have completed their 18th year are bound by this law until the beginning of their 60th year.

2. Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent are

also days of abstinence. On days of abstinence, meat should not be eaten at any meal. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics who have completed their 14th year.

The obligation to observe, as a whole or "substantially," the penitential days specified by the Church is a serious obligation. The Code of Cannon Law states: "On these days (of Penance), the faithful are in a special manner to devote themselves to prayer, to engage in works of piety and charity, to deny themselves, by fulfilling theur obligations more faithfully and especially by observing the fast and abstinence..."

Ideas for Observing Lent in the Domestic Church LENT: a time to grow closer to God. A time to take up practices that lead us toward him and to leave behind practices that distract us from him.

"Unless there is a Good Friday in your life, there can be no Easter Sunday." – Ven. Fulton Sheen

"Apart from the cross, there is no other ladder by which we may get to heaven." – St. Rose of Lima



- Pray, go to mass, confession, and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament as often as you can.
- Read the Bible daily; even just a chapter a day! Read Scripture and stories of the saints to children.
- Home décor: your home can reflect the penitential season (use burlap; cactus instead of flowers; simple candles and religious items on tables, mantles, etc). Incorporate the liturgical color of purple.
- Movie sacrifice idea: instead of a favorite show, watch a Catholic saints story or a religious film (free with your parishioner <u>FORMED</u> account). Or, use that time to read about the Faith or lives of the saints.
- Make pretzels: pretzels were first baked during Lent (<u>story here</u>) because they can be made with water, flour, and salt. The shape came from a posture of prayer: arms crossed and hands on opposite shoulders. <u>Recipe here</u>.
- Save money to give to the poor: brainstorm ideas for how you can do this as a family. Perhaps eat at home instead of going out and give the extra \$\$ to charity. Are there little luxuries that can be sacrificed and the money donated? Some families might choose to do an offering jar. As a family, place all your spare change in the jar for the entire season of Lent, and let your kids put it in the offering plate on Easter Sunday.
- Pray the "Stations of the Cross" on Fridays. If you can't go to the one at church, it is simple to pray them at home. <u>Click here</u> to print out the prayers (and pictures that children can color).
- Make a prayer chain: write a person or prayer request on 40 strips of paper. Assemble them into a paper chain. Remove one link per day, and pray for that thing with your kids.
- **Build a** Lenten Cross. Similar to an Advent wreath, you light one or more candles each night during dinner for the entire Lenten season.
- Sign up for "Holy Heroes" free Lenten adventure (kids ages 5-12): HolyHeroes.com
- Make a salt dough "crown of thorns" to place on your table: <u>link here</u>. For each Lenten sacrifice made, pull a toothpick out. The goal is to remove all the "thorns" by Easter. (Additionally, you can paint it gold and decorate with flowers where the "thorns" once were and use as an Easter centerpiece.)
- Bake an edible "crown of thorns" for Ash Wednesday or Good Friday: simply braid bread dough into a crown shape and bake. Push pretzel sticks ('thorns') into the crown as soon as it comes out of the oven. (idea here)
- Similar to the crown of thorns activity, you could also do "<u>sacrifice beans</u>." On the table is a bowl filled with dried beans next to a jar. When you make a sacrifice for Jesus, put a bean in the jar. Then, on Easter morning, children wake up to find that the beans that have accumulated in the jar during Lent have been changed into yummy jelly beans (or other such candies).
- Make some <u>empty tomb crafts</u> with kids. Try this <u>Calvary Hill Plant</u> that grows throughout Lent. Decorate with flowers on Easter morning and add a little <u>statue of Jesus</u> outside the empty tomb to represent the risen Lord. <u>Click here</u> for more. Kids love this fun project and you can use it as your Easter centerpiece!
- Try to set a daily goal to sacrifice in these areas:
 - Diet: sacrifice a food or drink you love
 - Physical: do something physically difficult every day (push-ups; daily walk; run a mile; etc.)
 - Spiritual: spend daily time with God in prayer and Scripture
