#### 2021 Annual Letter from Father Smith

Dear Friends in Christ,

I am very happy to present to you the Financial Report of the Parish for the period from July 2020-June 2021. First of all, I have to apologize that this report has come out much later than usual. The process by which we took our school accounting back in house from the diocese ended up in two competing sets of data that had to be deconflicted before presenting the report to you. We have given you a few updates during the announcements lately about where we are now in February 2022, so please keep in mind the time frame of this report, which basically covers the reopening of the church and its activities in the midst of the pandemic, after the lockdowns that ended right before the start date for this report.

The best news about this report is that, even though your parish insisted on a very strict curtailing of expenses during the pandemic with an extremely conservative approach to spending in view of the uncertainty of that time period, those of you who call Prince of Peace their spiritual home really stepped up in a big way to not only maintain your level of giving, but to increase it for the weekly offertory, which funds the ordinary day to day expenses of the parish. At a time when I honestly thought we were going to lose our shirts, we actually ended up with a modest surplus.

I also had a lot of fears that the pandemic would have a negative effect on our school, given that it was just beginning to recover from some lean years after our rededication to our mission as your parochial school. The pandemic forced many parents to rethink their educational choices, and that actually resulted in a notable *increase* in enrolment. Parents who joined our school community realized what they were missing when they came here, and the vast majority have stayed with us even when their previous schools reopened.

We have some interesting numbers for members. We actually grew by 337 newly registered households even as the average at Sunday Mass was quite low, because of the pandemic, so that makes for an interesting metric! The current number of registered families and Sunday Mass attendance as of February 2022 is much higher, and now places us well within the top tier of largest parishes in the Diocese.

Now that the worst of the pandemic seems to be over, we can reassess our conservative spending policies so they can reflect what best meets the spiritual needs of our parishioners. We now actually have a decent reserve and are committed to plan for systems failure and preventive instead of reactive maintenance. For years, HVAC, roofs and leaks were all addressed in a reactive rather than pro-active way; now we can get out in front of problems instead of lagging behind them, but that is possible only because of your continuing generosity during a time of financial uncertainty for everyone.

As the pledges of the Bicentennial Campaign continue to be paid, we can act on those very important projects that were identified as part of that Campaign, such as the staining and sealing of the floor and the lighting project, both of which were long overdue. Increased enrolment in the school means that we can enrich the curriculum and recruit the best teachers possible. But we also desperately need to address cost of living raises for both parish and school staff. They had years where their compensation grew not at all or very little, with more and more expected of them. The virtue of justice and the social teaching of the Church require that we begin to redress this lopsided issue by compensation that reflects their hard work and sacrifice. We can't keep the best if we don't invest in them, which is why your weekly offertory is so crucial to excellence in our parish and school.

We are also committed to providing a Catholic education for any member of the parish who wishes. We are now in a place where we can expand financial aid options for those who need it, and also have ended an untenable situation where families defaulted on tuition payments at an alarming rate. The fine leadership of Steve Cunningham and the Finance Subcommittee of the School Advisory Council, Thierry Wersinger and the Parish Finance Council, Phil Head as Director of Administration and Mark Pulley as Director of Finance have gotten us through a time which could have been quite precarious and endangered the sustainability of the school and many parish programs. We also have reduced the subsidy the parish pours into the school, so that they can grow towards greater financial independence. A few years ago some 28% of the school's budgeted expenses was floated by the parish. We hope next year to reduce that to 8%, which is a very healthy sign.

I want to take a moment to thank you for believing in Prince of Peace during this time. I very much look forward to all we can do together as you continue to give your time, talent and treasure for this great work of God.

#### Annual Financial Letter to the Parish

Dear Parishioners,

Prince of Peace is devoted to our mission of Catholic formation, fellowship, evangelization, service, and worship. By remaining committed to these core principles, our parish has and will continue to grow and flourish.

We are pleased to provide the results for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021 and the Budget for the next fiscal year. This past year was particularly rewarding as we maintained our offertory of \$1.464M at \$3K above the prior year. Without your generous support from the weekly offertory and the quarterly proceeds from the Bicentennial Campaign (\$84K received during FY21), we would not have been able to maintain the campus while making necessary capital improvements. In FY22, we have budgeted a 2.5% increase in offertory over FY21. In addition, the parish's Payroll Protection Program loan of \$91K was forgiven during FY21 further strengthening our financial position.

Prince of Peace Catholic School, our parish's primary apostolate, had a very successful year with enrollment reaching 175 students at the end of FY21. This was an 11.5% increase from 157 students for FY20. The parish was able to increase support of the school to \$165K during FY21, up from \$132K in FY20. Most of this \$33K increase was for the LED lighting upgrades (\$28K) in all the classrooms and administrative offices combined with the completion of deferred maintenance at the school. The school's Payroll Protection Program loan of \$216K was forgiven which is reflected in the FY21 financials. The FY22 Budget for the school is based on 170 student enrollment allowing the school to operate at a \$57K budgeted surplus. With this level of enrollment and the continued stabilization of the school under the leadership of Steve Cunningham, the parish has budgeted \$112K of support to the school (8% of the school's budgeted expenses) for FY22.

In addition to the normal parish administrative, operational and maintenance expenses found on the income statement and the parish support of the school described above, we had another active year with required capital expenditures across the campus. FY21 net capital expenditures totaled \$220K which were made for our parish's long-term future including LED lighting, network and phone system upgrades for the church and school.

We remain grateful to our parish and school staff and our incredibly faithful volunteers who make our church and school community that wonderful place of worship and education for our children – and a special thanks to our parishioners who have continued to generously support both the parish and school during these challenging times making outstanding things possible at Prince of Peace, our Spiritual Home.

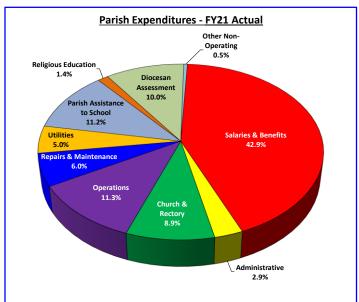

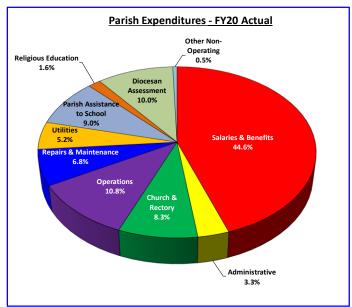

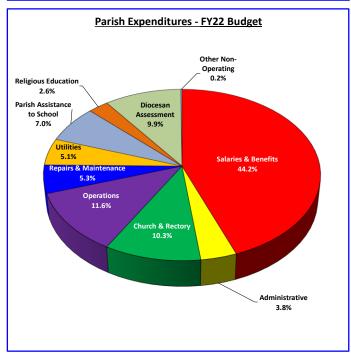

#### **Financial Highlights**

- Total Offertory of \$1,464K was \$3K favorable to Budget and \$3K higher than the prior fiscal year; Designated Offerings of \$70K were \$10K favorable to Budget and \$0.7K higher than the prior year.
- Other Income of \$26K was within \$2K of Budget, and unfavorable to the prior year by \$4K after adjusting for PPP loan forgiveness and Nativity donations.
- Salaries & Benefits were \$14K favorable to Budget while Administrative plus Church/Rectory expenses were \$18K and \$26K favorable to Budget, respectively.
- Utilities were \$6K and \$2K lower than Budget and prior fiscal year, respectively as cost saving measures continue to be implemented across our campus.
- Repairs and Maintenance were favorable to Budget by \$1K and prior year by \$11K as deferred maintenance has slowed due to the efforts of the last several years.
- Land, Buildings & Equipment increased a net \$220K for various campus wide lighting projects combined with technology upgrades, partially offset by prior year's Construction in Progress reduction cleared through retained surplus.
- Parish support to the school of \$165K was higher than Budget by about \$41K and \$33K higher than prior year due mostly to \$28K for LED lighting upgrades at the school. FY22 support of the school by the parish is budgeted for \$112K as the enrollment has increased and the school has stabilized.
- The balance sheet at June 30, 2021 shows cash of \$281K in checking and savings including \$109K in capital reserves.
- Parish obtained \$91K loan from the Paycheck Protection Program due to COVID-19 in FY20 which was forgiven in FY21.
- The ~8 acre 1225 Brushy Creek Road property was sold subsequent to FY21. The proceeds were used to pay off all remaining parish and school-related debt.
- The FY22 Budget forecasts Parish Offertory of \$1.5M, an increase of 2.5% over FY21. although concerns with the COVID-19 pandemic remain.

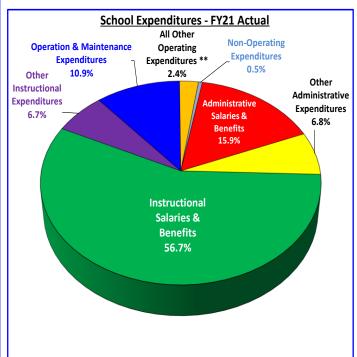

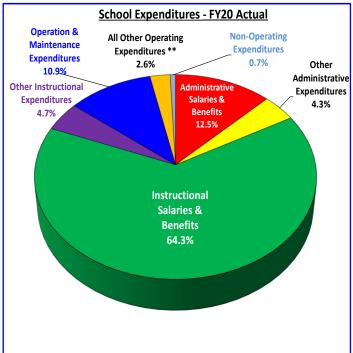

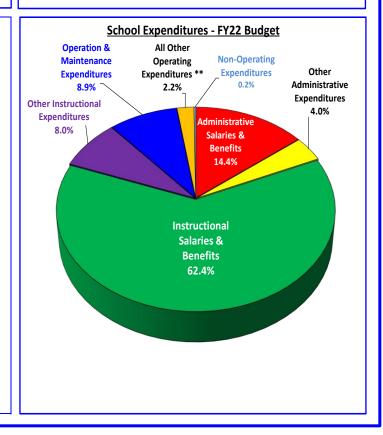

### **Financial Highlights**

- Total Tuition & Fees, Net increase of 30.4% from FY20 to FY21 Actual.
- ◆ Total Tuition & Fees, Net basically flat from FY21 Actual to FY22 Budget as enrollment has stabilized.
- Actual enrollment has increased from 157 in FY20 to 175 in FY21, and from 175 in FY21 to 177 (current enrollment) for FY22 (FY22 Budget at 170 enrollment).
- FY21 had no write-off for tuition non-payment versus FY20 which included a write-off of \$44.6K for tuition non-payment dating back to 2017.
- ◆ FY21 Cash (including savings) increased ~\$150K over FY20 reflecting a growing/vibrant school.
- Paycheck Protection Program loan including interest was forgiven (\$216K principal plus \$2.7K interest).
- ♦ FY22 Budget provides \$57K surplus for school at 170 student enrollment.
- ♦ FY22 Actual enrollment is currently 177, a 25% increase since FY19.
- FY22 Budget assumes a nurse, learning specialist, and academic summer camp paid for by CARES Act as well as Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).
- Parish support to the school of \$165K was higher than Budget by about \$41K and \$33K higher than prior year due mostly to \$28K for LED lighting upgrades at the school. FY22 support of the school by the parish is budgeted for \$112K as the enrollment has increased and the school has stabilized.
- K-4 Playground surface upgrade funded by \$55K from two grants partially completed at end of FY21.

- Supplemental Latin Roots program launched in 4th and 5th grade in 2019-2020.
- IXL learning enrichment program in math and reading established for all grades in 2019-2020.
- Service Club established for students in 4th through 8th grade in the fall of 2021.
