Letter from our Pastor

#### Dear Parishioners,

## An Extraordinary Parish for Ordinary People

Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre (1905-91) was a French missionary bishop who was almost single-handedly responsible for the conversion of large swaths of West Africa. In the heady days after Vatican II, he started a group of priests called the Society of St Pius X to, as he put it, "continue the work of Tradition." His missionary zeal and apostolic spirit inspired numerous priests, seminarians, sisters and laypeople to follow him. He was famous for continuing to observe the riches of the Latin liturgical tradition of the Roman Church when it was being quickly abandoned by many all over the world. He was vocally critical of many disturbing trends that were threatening the integrity of the faith. In 1988, he consecrated four bishops without the mandate of the Pope, an act for which he was immediately recognized as excommunicated by the Church. That excommunication was posthumously lifted by Pope Benedict XVI, in an effort to reconcile the numerous followers of this remarkable man who found themselves to varying degrees of impaired communion with the Catholic Church.

When the Archbishop performed this act which was widely considered to be schismatic, many people asked Pope St John Paul II for an accommodation by which they could continue to worship according to the traditional customs of the Roman Rite but within visible communion with the Church. That movement within the Church, as well as its analogous movement outside of visible communion with the Church, has grown.

Despite St John Paul II and Benedict XVI's attempts at reconciliation and recognizing the value of the traditional liturgy, there are currently forces within the Church who are bound and determined to undo that progress, in the name of the progress ushered in by Vatican II. The liturgical peace that we enjoyed before has reignited liturgy wars, and it seems like our churches and dioceses are becoming once again battlefields. I am profoundly saddened by this state of affairs, and hope for wisdom, mutual understanding and grace to prevail.

In the meantime, though, there are people who are anxious about the future, and wondering what to do next. Some have even posited that, "if we don't get to keep our Latin Mass, we will just go to the Society of St Pius X." Yet it is precisely that attitude which has inflamed the passions of those who are convinced that every person who loves the traditional liturgy of the Church is really a crypto-schismatic just playing lip service to the idea of communion with the Church.

Yet as the SSPX separated themselves from visible communion of the Catholic Church in the name of "true religion", they have had their own constant internal divisions and have produced a dizzying array of spinoffs. It is the same sad story as Orthodox and Protestant Christians who all use their own private judgment to declare themselves as the only true religion and multiply by dividing.

Prince of Peace is a Catholic church. We are in communion with the Pope, with the Bishop of Charleston, and seek to live out the fullness of our Catholic tradition in reasoned obedience to legitimate superiors. You will never find me encouraging anyone to go over to the Society of St Pius X or to the Orthodox because they have given into fearmongering and are willing to break communion with the Church because of their attachment to a particular expression of the faith. I understand on a human level why people who have felt hurt by Church leaders feel that they have no other option than to decamp where they feel like they can worship God and be at peace. But at the same time though we can also obfuscate the clear theological reality that we are called to communion and have to live that communion out in some very difficult times. You don't jump out of a boat because it takes on water; you stay and you help fix it with your boatmates. And there is only one captain, even of others like to use the title and the uniform that doesn't properly belong to them. Do not be deceived.



automated external defibrillator (AED)

Our campus has 3 automated external defibrillators (AEDs) available for cardiac arrest. They are all maintained regularly by our school nurse.

- 1. In the church, an AED is located just outside the ladies restroom by the bookcase.
- 2. In the school, an AED is available outside the healthroom.
- 3. In the PAC, an AED is available at the water fountain.

If you see someone collapse suddenly and they are not responsive, you need to CALL-PUSH-SHOCK. This means that you must immediately call 911, begin Hands-Only CPR, and use an AED to restart their heart.

 STEP I – CALL: Recognize Cardiac Arrest and Call 911

Scene Safety: perform a quick survey of the scene to make sure that it's safe for you to help. Check for responsiveness: if the victim is not responsive and not breathing normally, they might be in cardiac arrest. If you have a phone immediately available to you, call 911. Otherwise, ask someone else to call 911. In either case, begin CPR as soon as possible. According to the American Heart Association (AHA), "CPR is the single-most important intervention for a patient in cardiac arrest and should be provided until a defibrillator is applied to minimize interruptions in compressions."

• STEP 2 – PUSH: Perform CPR

Start CPR: push hard and fast on the center of the chest while someone is calling 911 and ask another person to get the AED

STEP 3 – SHOCK: The AHA says, "Early defibrillation improves outcome from cardiac arrest."
 When the AED arrives, follow the steps on the device and with 911 on how to use it.

## An Extraordinary Parish for Ordinary People

The Epiphany of the Lord. The Solemnity of the Epiphany is celebrated either on January 6 or on the Sunday between January 2 and 8. This feast day marks the twelfth day of Christmas and celebrates the young Messiah being revealed as the light of the nations. In the Latin Rite of the Church, Epiphany (comes from the Greek, meaning "revelation from above") celebrates the revelation that Jesus is the Son of God. It focuses primarily on this revelation to the Magi; but also in the baptism in the Jordan and the wedding at Cana. The Early Church celebrated the advent of Christ by commemorating the Nativity, Visitation of the Magi, Baptism of Christ and the Wedding of Cana all in one feast of the Epiphany. At the Council of Tours in 567, the Church set Christmas day and Epiphany as separate feasts, and named the twelve days between them as the Christmas season. The traditions surrounding the Feast of the Epiphany point to the Magi, the first gentiles to meet Christ. The Bible does not list the names or the number of the wise men, but we do know they were intelligent, wealthy, and brave. The gifts they brought to the Christ-child (gold, frankincense and myrrh) were gifts that point not only to Christ's divinity and his revelation to the Magi as the King of Kings, but also to his crucifixion. Giving herbs traditionally used for burial was a foreshadowing of what is to come. There are many Epiphany traditions around the world. In Italy, La Befana brings sweets and presents to children not on Christmas, but on Epiphany. Children in many parts of Latin America, the Philippines, Portugal, and Spain also receive their presents on "Three Kings Day" (children leave shoes out on the eve of Epiphany to receive treats and money from the Kings, similar to St. Nick's Day). In Ireland, Catholics celebrate "Women's Christmas" – women rest from housework and cleaning and celebrate with a special meal. In Germany, groups of young people called Sternsinger (Star Singers) travel door to door dressed as the three Wiseman, with the leader carrying a star. Germans eat a golden pastry ring filled with orange and spice representing gold, frankincense and myrrh. They decorate Christmas trees with cookies and sweets that are to be enjoyed on Epiphany. In England, the night before Epiphany is known as Twelfth Night. It is a time for plays, practical jokes, Twelfth Night Cake, and wassailing. The Yule Log was lit on Christmas day and remained burning until Epiphany. For Christians, the symbolism of the Yule log is that it represented keeping the stable warm for baby Jesus. These days, log shaped chocolate cakes are often eaten in place of the Yule logs.

#### Ideas for celebrating in your home:

- It is traditional to celebrate Epiphany with a Kings Cake: a sweet cake that contains an object like a plastic figure, bean or nut. If you get the bean, you are King or Queen for the day! <u>Recipe here</u>.
- Nativity scene: the infant Jesus could be given a small gold crown or regal robe. The figures of the wise men should have reached the manger by now!
- It is traditional to bless your home on Epiphany using blessed chalk (given out at church). Over the door is inscribed: 20 + C + M + B + 23. The initials CMB stand for the names of the Wisemen or for "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means "May Christ bless this house"
- Put on a play: celebrate the three kings by asking children to act out the story of the Magi coming to visit the newborn king. Bedsheets and tablecloths make great robes and crowns can be homemade (tip: Burger King is happy to give out crowns to customers!). Children can carry the three gifts to the Christ-child

in the manger: <u>click</u> <u>here for how to make</u> <u>edible "gifts"</u> that are symbolic of the gold, frankincense and myrrh. Be sure to sing "We Three Kings"!
