Letter from our Pastor

An Extraordinary Parish for Ordinary People

Dear Friends,

What does the Magisterium of the Catholic Church teach about the duty of parents to do everything they can to give their children a Catholic education, and on pastors to provide a Catholic education for as many in their care as they can?

In 1884, the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore obligated Catholic parents to send their children to Catholic schools and instructed pastors to start schools in every parish in the country. Until then, the Bishops of this country had strongly suggested it, because public schools were often used as vehicles for anti-Catholicism. Popes Pius IX, Leo XIII and Pius XI saw that the drift towards moral relativism and religious indifferentism affected not only the United States but was imperiling the salvation of souls of Catholic children all over Europe, with its secularization and *-isms* of so many types denying objective truth and divine revelation. That was 141 years ago. Can we honestly say that the situation has improved today?

Pope Pius XI in his encyclical <u>Divini Illius Magistri</u> ("On Christian Education") wrote: We renew and confirm their declarations, as well as the sacred Canons, in which the frequenting of non-Catholic schools, whether neutral or mixed, those namely which are open to Catholics and non-Catholics alike, is forbidden for Catholic children, and can be at most tolerated, on the approval of the Ordinary alone, under determined circumstances of place and time, and with special precautions. It is necessary that all the teaching and the whole organization of the school, its teachers, syllabus, and textbooks in every branch be regulated by the Christian spirit, under the direction and maternal supervision of the Church; so that religion may be in very truth the foundation and crown of the youth's entire training; and this in every grade of school, not only the elementary, but the intermediate and the higher institutions of learning as well.

Pope Leo XIII declared in his encyclical Affari vos: Without religion there can be no moral education deserving of the name ... to be desirous that minds should be imbued with good and at the same time to leave them without religion is as senseless as to invite people to virtue after having taken away the foundations on which it rests. For the Catholic there is only one true religion, the Catholic religion; and, therefore, when it is a question of the teaching of morality or religion, he can neither accept nor recognize any which is not drawn from Catholic doctrine. For our children cannot go for instruction to schools which either ignore or of set purpose combat the Catholic religion, or in which its teachings are despised and its fundamental principles repudiated. Wherever the Church has allowed this to be done, it has only been with pain and through necessity, at the same time surrounding her children with many safeguards which, nevertheless it has been too often recognized [to] have been insufficient to cope successfully with the danger attending it. Similarly, it is necessary to avoid at all costs, as most dangerous, those schools in which all beliefs are welcomed and treated as equal, as if, in what regards God and divine things, it makes no difference whether one believes rightly or wrongly, and takes up with truth or error. You know well, Venerable Brethren, that every school of this kind has been condemned by the Church, because nothing can be more harmful or better calculated to ruin the integrity of the faith and to turn aside the tender minds of the young from the way of truth.

Lest you think these were all pre-Vatican II obligations that are no longer relevant, even the 1983 Code of Canon Law 798 stipulates: Parents are to entrust their children to those schools which provide a Catholic education. If they are unable to do this, they are obliged to take care that suitable Catholic education is provided for their children outside the schools.

And the Catechism of the Catholic Church paragraph 2229: As those first responsible for the education of their children, parents have the right to choose a school for them which corresponds to their own convictions. This right is fundamental. As far as possible parents have the duty of choosing schools that will best help them in their task as Christian educators. Public authorities have the duty of guaranteeing this parental right and of ensuring the concrete conditions for its exercise.



volleyball begins



fr smith's lenten reading recommendation

This year marks the 1700th anniversary of the first of the 21 ecumenical councils of the Catholic Church, the First Council of Nicea. The Emperor Constantine called all of the bishops of the world to a meeting to develop a consensus on what the deposit of faith had to reveal about the divinity of Jesus Christ. Christians were divided amongst themselves because of the novel teaching of Arius that Jesus was not fully God, which provoked the censure of Saint Athanasius of Alexandria. The result of that meeting was a profession of faith called the Nicene Creed, which we pray every Sunday (albeit with a few additions from another ecumenical council, Constantinople I, from 381).

But where is Nicea today? Our parish has a long standing relationship with the Church in Turkey, specifically with the parish in Bursa, which is the closest Christian community near the site of ancient Nicea, known in Turkish as Iznik. Today, tourists go to Iznik to see the tremendously beautiful tile work produced by expert craftsmen. Christians will go and, when they find out that they are standing in the city of the first ecumenical council, will ask themselves where that historic event took place.

Mark Fairchild, a theology professor at Huntington University, was part of an archeological expedition underwater which found a basilica that matches all of the known data about the place the council was held. His book: The Underwater Basilica of Nicaea: Archaeology in the Birthplace of Christian Theology was released in November 2024. In this book, the Indiana Jones of the Primitive Church discusses the world where this council took place, how Christianity came to it and why the Emperor chose it, out of so many possible places, for a meeting that would change the course of Christian history. The discovery of an underwater church and royal meeting hall in 2014 and the daring research done about it has been one of the most groundbreaking events in archeological and theological history. How did it end up at the bottom of a lake, and what secrets does it yield about our Christian history that are relevant for today?

When we recite the Nicene Creed every Lord's Day, it's hard to envision where it came from, and sometimes, even why it has been such an important part of Christian belief and practice enduring over 1700 years! After reading this book as our parish Lenten reading, my hope is that, by learning more about our ancient Christian history near the place where we cooperate in mission, the Creed will come alive as a vital part of our worship!
